#### **Public Involvement & Engagement (PPIE) Fund**

SPCR has launched a new PPIE funding call to provide researchers with funds to explore and develop new relationships with groups, organisations and communities currently under-served by research or health and care in general.

Funding can be requested for up to £8,000 for projects up to 18 months. Applicants do not have to apply for the full £8,000 and smaller funding requests are welcomed as well. The SPCR aims to fund a combination of smaller and larger projects. The funding is open to researchers based in the NIHR SPCR member departments.

Applicants will be required to submit a video and an application form detailing their project. The deadline to apply is **1pm on Thursday 23rd May 2024.**
